COMPLAINT

COMES NOW J. G. Landreth, Investigator for the Oklahoma Board of Medical Licensure and Supervision, being first duly sworn upon oath and states:

1. That Floyd E. Webb, M.D., holding Oklahoma Medical License Number 7217, is in violation of the Oklahoma Medical Practice Act, 59 O.S. 1981 Section 509, Paragraph 17, to-wit:

"17. Prescribing, dispensing or administering of Controlled Substances or Narcotic drugs in excess of the amount considered good medical practice, or prescribing, dispensing or administering controlled substances or narcotic drugs without medical need in accordance with published standards."

2. That Floyd E. Webb, M.D., is in violation of the rules and regulations promulgated by this Board, specifically Section X, Rules 1A, 1B, and 1F, to-wit:

"Rule 1A. Indiscriminate or excessive prescribing, dispensing, or administering of controlled or narcotic drugs."

"Rule 1B. Prescribing, dispensing or administering of controlled or narcotic drugs in excess of the amount considered good medical practice."

"Rule 1F. Dispensing, prescribing or administering a controlled substance or narcotic drug without medical need."

3. That from April 1, 1990 through August 20, 1990 Defendant wrote approximately 994 prescriptions for Controlled or

Narcotic drugs totalling 41,487 dosage units, plus 38 prescriptions of other forms of Controlled or Narcotic drugs totalling 5,392 dosage units.

4. That a prescription and patient records survey in reference to certain scheduled drugs reveals that patient G.D. received approximately 20 prescriptions from the time of September 7, 1988 through July 13, 1990 for 1,166 dosage units of Controlled or Narcotic drugs or an average of 1.72 dosage units per day. With the exception of two prescriptions for Vicodin, number 24 and 36, the remainder of the prescriptions were for Dilaudid 4 mg.

5. That the prescription and patient records survey reveals that patient J.A. received 13 prescriptions for Controlled or Narcotic drugs from May 16, 1989 through August 10, 1990 for a total of 475 dosage units or an average of 1.05 dosage units per day. With the exception of one prescription for Vicodin, number 24, the remainder of the prescriptions were for Dilaudid, 4 mg.

6. That the prescription and patient records survey reveals that patient F.H. received 7 prescriptions for Controlled or Narcotic drugs from January 30, 1989 through August 30, 1990 for a total of 416 dosage units or an average of .70 dosage units per day. All of these prescriptions were for Dilaudid, 4 mg.

7. That the prescription and patient records survey reveals that patient K.H. received 14 prescriptions for Controlled or Narcotics drugs from May 19, 1989 through August 29, 1990 for a total of 367 dosage units or an average of .79 dosage units per day. With the exception of one prescription for Lorcet, number 35, the remainder of the prescriptions were for Preludin and Desoxyn.

8. That the prescription and patient records survey reveals that patient S.L. received 9 prescriptions for Controlled or Narcotic drugs from the period January 2, 1989 through September 7, 1990 for a total of 336 dosage units or an average of .55 dosage units per day. All of these prescriptions were for Dilaudid, 4 mg.

9. That the prescription and patient records survey

reveals that patient R.R. received 7 prescriptions for Controlled or Narcotic drugs from the period of July 22, 1988 through January 27, 1989 for a total of 240 dosage units or an average of 1.27 dosage units per day. All of these prescriptions were for Dilaudid, 4 mg.


10. That the prescription and patient records survey reveals that patient R.A. received 12 prescriptions for Controlled or Narcotic drugs from April 3, 1990 through August 7, 1990 for a total of 1,420 dosage units or an average of 11.18 dosage units per day.

11. That the prescription and patient records survey reveals that patient E.G. received 24 prescriptions for Controlled or Narcotic drugs from April 2, 1990 through July 24, 1990 for a total of 1,210 dosage units or an average of 10.61 dosage units per day.

12. That the prescription and patient records survey reveals that patient M.D. received 48 prescriptions for Controlled or Narcotic drugs from April 4, 1990 through August 15, 1990 for a total of 1,283 dosage units or an average of 9.57 dosage units per day.


13. That other patient records reveal that Scheduled drugs were being prescribed in excess of the amount considered for the medical need presented.

WHEREFORE, Complainant prays this Board to conduct a hearing and upon proof of the allegations contained herein that such disciplinary action be taken by the Board as is authorized by law.
