## COMPLAINT

COMES NOW D. C. Mosshart, Inspector for the Oklahoma Board of Medical Examiners, being first duly sworn upon oath and states:

 That Griffith C. Miller, M.D., holding Oklahoma Medical License No. 7796, is in violation of the Oklahoma Medical Practice Act, 59 O.S. 1981, \$509, paragraph 17, to-wit:

"17. Prescribing, dispensing or administering of controlled substances or narcotic drugs in excess of the amount considered good medical practice, or prescribing, dispensing or administering controlled substances or narcotic drugs without medical need in accordance with published standards."

2. That Griffith C. Miller, M.D., is in violation of the Rules and Regulations promulgated by this Board, specifically Section IX, Rules 1, 2, and 6, to-wit:

- "Rule 1: Indiscriminate or excessive prescribing, dispensing or administering of Controlled or Narcotic drugs."
- "Rule 2: Prescribing, dispensing or administering of Controlled or Narcotic drugs in excess of the amount considered good medical practice."
- "Rule 6: Dispensing, prescribing or administering a Controlled substance or Narcotic drug without medical need."

3. That from November 1, 1982, through February 22, 1983, Dr. Miller wrote approximately 568 prescriptions for approximately 22,270 dosage units and 592 ounces of Scheduled III, IV and V drugs, not counting refills of 5,710 dosage units and 628 ounces. 4. That a prescription survey conducted in reference to certain Scheduled Drugs reveals that patient S. P. received approximately 1,334 dosage units of Darvon, T-Diet, Darvocet Placidyl from October 27, 1982, through February 7, 1983.

5. That the survey reveals that patient C. J. prescribed approximately 2,862 dosage units of T-Koff, T-Gesic, Valium, Darvocet and Lomotil from January 16, 1982, through February 4, 1983.

6. The survey reveals that on several occasions, multiple prescriptions were written on the same day to the same patient.

7. That patient records reveal that Scheduled Drugs were being prescribed in excess of the amount considered necessary the medical need presented.

WHEREFORE, Complainant prays this Board to conduct a hearing and upon proof of the allegations contained herein that such disciplinary action be taken by the Board as is authorized by law
